CREATING EQUAL: EMBODIED ELEMENTS

As our society begins to awake from hibernation, and we carve new nations out of community, we the people have a unique opportunity to reimagine embodied connection. In this virtual workshop, Imani Williams, Micah Rosegrant, and Jessi Stegall will invite participants into a movement practice of using our bodies as sites for exploring the earth, listening to self, and setting intentions for future practice. Participants will have opportunities for both solo work and group interaction. This event is open to all skill levels and abilities. Come with something comfortable to move in, a connection to the natural world (e.g. a window to look out of, a glass of water, a stone, a plant), and a willingness to explore.
